Warm-Up: Bad Sources Changing History

Description: Have students read the article **5.1-A Three Historical Examples of "Fake News"** aloud about the times that misinformation changed history. Then have them discuss the importance of quality information and good sources and how bad sources, untrustworthy sources, and misinformation can have devastating consequences. Sample Questions:

- How can false information hurt people?
- What can we do to check information for accuracy?
- What are some of the reasons people have for giving out false information? (e.g. They
 want to support their own viewpoint; they are in a hurry and don't properly vet their
 sources; they feel uncomfortable saying, "I don't know.")

• What are some ways to ask for more time to do research when you aren't certain of the answer to a question? (e.g. "Let me check into that for you", "I'll need to do some research before I can give you a good answer", "I'm going to explore that a bit and get back to you.")

Purpose/Key Skills: The purpose of this activity is to get students thinking about where their information comes from and whether the things they "know to be true" really are.

(1) Career Research Project: Planning

Description: Hand out **5.1-B Career Research Project** and instruct students that they will be writing a two-page paper on their desired job. But first, they'll go through the process of researching it. They'll look at the handout on "Developing A Research Question" and use strategy mapping to narrow their topic to something specific they want to learn about their potential future career.

Next, they'll look at the "How to Conduct Research Online" to figure out specific keywords, fields of study, and experts they might look into in their research.

Purpose/Key Skills: The purpose of this activity is both to help students learn how to project plan and give them the foundations for good research. It will also provide a guideline for how to research future potential careers.

(2) Career Research Project: Finding and Evaluating Sources

Description: Now that students know their question, they can begin to plan and seek out their research. Have them watch the video <u>Evaluating Sources for Credibility</u> and look over the **5.1-E Credible vs. Non-Credible Sources** and **5.1-F Using Google More Effectively**.

Next have them discuss where they might seek out information as a class, for example, using

Google Scholar, newspapers, the U.S. Government statistics, university websites, the school library's research databases, etc. in order to find quality information.

Purpose/Key Skills: The purpose of this activity is to get students to think about what credible sources are, but also for them to help one another brainstorm on what sources they can use for this project.

(3) Career Research Project: Doing the Research

Description: Have students go to a computer lab or library and do research on their question for the Career Research Project. Require that they find three to five quality sources. Then have them write up an annotated bibliography, citing their sources, giving a brief summary of the information in each, and including how they plan to use it. Hand out **5.1-1 Annotated Bibliography Worksheet** to help them plan out their work.

Purpose/Key Skills: The purpose of this activity is for students to learn to research and organize their work so that they have a good research foundation before starting their paper.
